
Eighteenth Annual Stop the Wrecking Ball

"We're using our past to build our future"

Trenton's City Hall, designed in 1908 and completed in 1911, was built to reflect the city's success.

The façade is pure white Grade A marble, from the Vermont Marble Company.

The flooring of all the main corridors is also white marble, as is their wainscoting to a height of six feet.

Each of the 5,987 pieces of marble used in the building was cut and numbered in Vermont for shipment to Trenton in 119 freight cars.

The marble was then hauled to the site by horse and wagon.

The bronze doorknobs you turn to enter the City Council Chamber are castings of the city seal.

Inside is a room that is the glory of the building:
Two stories high, with a gilt-ornamented ceiling, its windows and doors are flanked by marble pilasters topped by gilded Corinthian columns.

But it's Everett Shinn's mural that catches every eye.

Mounted on the wall above the dais where City Council sits, forty-five feet wide by twenty-two feet long, it's by turns dark and fiery.

The left side shows the wire drawing process at John A. Roebling's Sons Company, while the right pictures workmen stoking and loading a kiln at the Maddock Pottery.


One of Trenton's great interior spaces is a fitting place to celebrate our commitment to preservation.


