
Nineteenth Annual Stop the Wrecking Ball

"We're using our past to build our future"

One of Trenton's great interior spaces is a fitting place to celebrate our commitment to preservation.

More than most buildings, the former bank at 1 West State is a product of its timing. It was planned in 1929, while Trenton threw itself into the 250th celebration of the city's 1679 settlement. So great was the patriotic fervor with which Trentonians got caught up in their history that a rusticated stone building in Renaissance Revival style ended up with a Colonial Revival boardroom, designed to recall an 18th century tavern.

A tavern isn't the sort of image most banks want to adopt, but the board of First Mechanics Bank ~ led by former Governor Edward C. Stokes ~ came to be justly proud of the history of this site. Indeed, when the bank opened to the public in 1930, the handsome booklet published to celebrate it was entitled

"Perpetuating the Corner Historic."

Here, in a succession of taverns with better than average names,

Congress met, Lafayette was hosted before his return to France,


New Jersey ratified the Constitution of the United States and

Having commissioned a building that would have been at home in

15th century Florence, the bank overlaid it with a new pride in Trenton.






